CHILD AND FAMILY SERVICES

All programs with the exception of the ICWA program are located at the CITC offices at 3600 San Jeronimo Drive, Anchorage, Alaska 99508.

The vision of the Child and Family Services department is to promote safe, secure and healthy families that can nurture future generations. All programs work in partnership with our families to develop a seamless continuum of opportunities to assist children and their families in meeting their endless potential.

Child Abuse Prevention Programs

The overall goal of CITC prevention programs is to prevent child abuse and neglect by reducing family stress, strengthening the family unit, promoting positive parent-child interaction including father involvement and promoting healthy child growth and development. Our culturally competent staff provides home-based services, prenatal child development, parenting classes, and, life skill development, supportive services.

Family Assessment Program

Case Managers conduct home visit interviews and assessments with families who have a “low-level risk” report of harm with the State of Alaska Office of Children’s Services (OCS). The program goal is to provide preventative in-home services and to keep families from becoming more involved with OCS. This voluntary program offers a range of services including short-term case management, client advocacy and community referrals. Our staff provides alternative and culturally appropriate response to traditional child protection investigation for child safety concerns.

Intensive Family Preservation Program

The Intensive Family Preservation program provides assistance to families involved with the State of Alaska Office of Children's Services (OCS). This program provides individual and family therapy, case management and skill development to families in crisis. The overall goal is to achieve permanency planning for families while promoting child safety, permanency, cultural continuity and well-being. Our staff provide intensive services in the home environment from a solution focused, strength based approach.

Visitation Services Program

This program provides supervised visitation services to families with children who have been removed from their homes by the State of Alaska Office of Children's Services (OCS) and have been placed in the foster care system. Visitation takes place on site in a safe, family-friendly atmosphere. Parents and children are encouraged to eat meals together, do homework, arts and crafts, and various other activities that promote parent and child bonding. Referrals are accepted from OCS social workers.

Indian Child Welfare Act (ICWA) Help Desk

The ICWA Help Desk is located at the State of Alaska Office of Children's Services (OCS) to support compliance with the Indian Child Welfare Act. Services include conducting tribal and relative searches for Alaska Native and American Indian children that are in out-of-home placement. Additional services include participation in case staffing and encouraging the timely tribal notification of Native children in state custody.

COMMUNITY SHARED SERVICES

The goal of the Shared Services department is to lower administrative costs for nonprofit organizations that subscribe to our services, thus allowing more dollars to flow into programs. Established in 1999, the Shared Services department provides services to CITC, CIRI-affiliated agencies and nonprofits affiliated with the Foraker Group.

EDUCATIONAL SERVICES SYSTEM

The Educational Services System (ESS) provides educational and work programs which empower Alaska Native and Native American students of all ages to enhance their academic experiences and career potential. ESS offers curricula and teaching techniques that emphasize individual student needs and cultural understanding. Comprehensive school-to-life transition planning and follow up are also integral elements of all ESS programs. Academic Support Services

The Johnson O'Malley Program, implemented under Public Law 477, serves the 'specialized and unique educational needs' of Alaska Native/Native American students in targeted schools in the Anchorage School District. Assistant Teachers provide in-school academic services and after-school programs in the following schools: Bartlett High, Dimond High, East High, West High, Clark Middle, Mears Middle, Romig Middle and Wendler Middle Schools. The program is implemented under the guidance of a Native Education Advisory Committee, elected from parents of Alaska Native/American Indian students in the Anchorage School District.

Anchorage Youth Services/Rural Youth Services

- **Anchorage Youth Services** (formally Youth Employment Services) program focuses on providing opportunities for income eligible, at-risk Alaska Native/American Indian/Native Hawaiian youth to gain work skills, pre-employment training, improve their academic performance, earn high school elective credit through work-study programs, and as a bridge to

other long-term employment opportunities. This year-round program provides on-site work experience to youth, ages 14 to 21 in the Anchorage area. Assessment and referral services are also provided from the AYS offices. This service is also for students who are out of school for any reason and are in need of options.

- **Rural Youth Services (RYS)** program focuses on providing opportunities for income eligible, at-risk Alaska Native/American Indian/Native Hawaiian youth to gain work skills, pre-employment training, improve their academic performance, earn high school elective credit through work-study programs, and as a bridge to other long-term employment opportunities. This year-round program provides on-site work experience to youth, ages 14 to 21 residing in CIRI communities. Assessment and referral services are also provided from the RYS offices. This service is also for students who are out of school for any reason and are in need of options. The CIRI communities of Chickaloon Traditional Council, Native Village of Eklutna, Knik Tribal Council, Ninilchik Traditional Council, Salamatof Native Association, Seldovia Village Tribe, and Native Village of Tyonek all have a youth representative available to talk with youth regarding eligibility and goals.

At MEDI AK, our mission is to engage Native Students in the creation of media and inspire them to realize their unlimited potential.

MEDI AK offers Native High School students who are enrolled in CITC's Partners for Success program with opportunities to engage in media and career activities. The intent is to provide students with hands-on experience in the creation of media so that they learn to articulate their issues in a constructive manner and experience for themselves the power of their voice. Media activities will be supplemented with career activities to ensure that students leave the program with the knowledge, skills and behaviors necessary to be successful in whatever path they choose after high school.

Some of the activities available through MEDI AK are:

- Field trips to local media workplaces
- Job shadows with adult mentors at media worksites
- Media workshops that teach everything from pre-production planning

- through to editing and presenting finished projects
- Project-based learning opportunities that include participation in weekly live radio broadcasts, creation and screening of original short films, and the publication of Alaska Aloud, a unique magazine by and for Alaska Native youth.
- Career activities ranging from individual interest and aptitude assessments up to job seeking workshops such as: resume writing and interview skills
- Summer Media Institute where students can spend from one to four weeks developing their media skills and gaining exposure to media professionals
- Internships at local media workplaces
- Opportunity to be connected with a student mentor or to be a student mentor themselves

The MEDIAC program also has opportunities for students to earn academic credit and a monetary stipend for serving as Media Interns at media worksites throughout our community. Interested students should contact the MEDIAC office and make arrangements to talk to a staff member about enrolling in the MEDIAC program.

Mentoring Initiative

The Mentoring Initiative focuses on providing school-based mentoring programs for middle school youth currently enrolled in the Partners for Success Program. Activities provide opportunities for youth to gain a positive role-model and mentor in their lives. Mentors volunteer one hour per week to inspire goals, increase self-confidence, build ASSETS, encourage increased school attendance, share their culture and explore life opportunities through personalized attention. Students enrolled in CITC classes in the following schools are eligible to participate in the school-based mentoring program: Clark Middle School, Romig Middle School, Wendler Middle School, and Mears Middle School. Contact us if you would like to become a mentor or if you can help make a difference in a young person's life in another way.

Na Tikhatnu K'tiya Camp

A 10 day summer camp program providing Alaska Native and American Indian youth ages 14-18 residing in the CIRI region the opportunity to gain pre-employment skills and work ethics, learn culturally traditional activities, explore environmental education, practice group dynamic and conflict resolution styles, and earn educational credits and first aid/CPR certification in a rural camp setting in Ninilchik, Alaska.

NYO Games Alaska

NYO is a unique athletic competition which celebrates the athleticism and spirit of traditional Native games. We host three annual events:

- **Junior NYO** –for any Alaskan students in 1st-6th grade
- **Anchorage Preliminaries** – where Anchorage area middle and high school students vie for a spot on the Anchorage Senior NYO (SNYO) team
- **Senior NYO** – for any Alaskan middle and high school students

We offer an annual handbook with yearly updates and step by step instructions, an instructional video, classroom/school demonstrations, and connections to a network of coaches and athletes.

Partners for Success Program

Partners for Success is a supplemental program aimed at improving educational outcomes of Alaska Native and Native American student in grades 7 through 12. Partnering with the Anchorage School District, CITC provides accredited core math and language arts classes within eight schools: Bartlett, Dimond, East, West, Clark, Mears, Romig and Wendler. In each school, CITC's three-to five-person team provides personalized school and home-based wraparound services to students and their families. The CITC school team, comprised of a certified teacher(s), an assistant teacher, a family advocate, and a counselor, strives to build positive relationships with students and families founded upon respect for every individual as a whole being. The classes are student-centered and standards-based with strong cultural, career exploration and Developmental Asset components. The hands-on and individualized learning that takes place in CITC classes directly relates to students' lives – their values, cultures, interests and real-life experiences. Family support and community involvement in education are also strongly emphasized through this program. Our classrooms strive to build a foundation for success, improve student achievement and support the endless potential of our students, families and communities for generations to come.

The **Tribal Training Grant** program provides supplementary vocational funding for Alaska Native, American Indian and Native Hawaiian residents of the Cook Inlet region service area to achieve short-term training or certification intended for employment.

The **Tribal Higher Education Scholarship** program provides supplementary financial aid for Native CIRI shareholders and direct lineal descendants of original CIRI enrollees pursuing postsecondary education from an accredited training facility, college or university. Deadlines are June 30th for Fall funding and December 1st for Spring funding.

The **Alyeska Match Scholarship** provides supplementary matching scholarships to qualified Alaska Native students in training for Engineering, Information Technology, and Business fields. *Qualified fields of study are subject to change without notice- please contact the Tribal Scholarships and Grants Program for current eligibility requirements.* Deadlines are June 30th for Fall funding and December 1st for Spring funding.

All funding is considered supplemental and is not intended to cover the full cost of education. Funding is used specifically for tuition, fees, course-required books, supplies, campus housing/meal plans. It is available on a first-come, first-completed basis for students that meet the eligibility requirements as stated on the applications. WIA Youth Program

The Workforce Investment Act (WIA) Youth Program WIA has partnered with other CITC Departments and outside agencies to provide employment, training and education related services for low income youth ages 14 to 21. The following is a list of services available to eligible youth in our program:

EMPLOYMENT AND TRAINING SERVICES

The Employment and Training Services department provides a safe and supportive environment where participants receive support as they progress through lifestyle changes, and enhance their communication, life management and academic skills to succeed in the work world. Finding employment that promotes self-sufficiency is the hallmark of this program. Staff use a strengths-based approach to support participants during transitions into work.

ETSD Vision: To walk with our participants as they use their strengths and traditions to achieve their full potential.

Job seekers can stop by the CDC and Alaska's People for job search, employability skills classes and Adult Basic Education. The CDC and Alaska's People provides: resume, cover letter and job search assistance, GED preparation classes, typing tutorials, basic computer skills training, career guidance, and employability/life skills classes. The CDC also has information on education and training opportunities, access to the Alaska Career Information System and a phone, fax and copier to use for job search purposes. The CDC partners with Nine Star Enterprises via AmeriCorps volunteers.

Alaska's People offers employment referral for job seekers with experience ranging from entry to executive level. Services also include employee recruitment, career and job counseling, resume development, training and education referral, social service referral, student intern referral and

service information at career and job fair presentations. Over the years, Alaska's People has developed working relationships with a growing list of successful Alaskan employers and continue to match skills and abilities with exciting new careers.

The new Career Track component of the CDC provides participants the opportunity to develop a career plan by tapping into interests, aptitudes, abilities, work skills, education, experience and work interests to develop a career track that leads toward not just a job, but also a bright future!

This program provides financial assistance for burial costs. Eligibility requirements: Alaska Natives and Native Americans who reside in the Anchorage area, and other Alaska Native CIRI Shareholders who live outside the Anchorage area when no other resources are available and not eligible for public assistance burial. Proof of Indian blood is necessary for burial assistance.

The Child Care Assistance Program provides financial assistance to Alaska Native and Native American families who are in need of daycare services for children under the age of 13. Fees are determined on a sliding scale. The extent of childcare needs is based on the parents' activities. Parents must be engaged in educational, training and employment. Priority is given to children of families with special needs. Childcare may be utilized in a variety of categories including center-based, approved home, licensed home and in-home care.

The Alaska Food Stamp Program provides food benefits to low-income households. The federal government funds 100% of the food stamp benefit. Medicaid, an entitlement program created by the federal government, is the

primary public program for financing basic health and long-term care services for low-income Alaskans.

These programs are administered by the State of Alaska and are available to all Alaskan residents who meet the income and resource limits of the programs. In order to provide quality customer service to the participants of the CITC service area, the Alaska Division of Public Assistance has stationed caseworkers within the CITC building.

General Assistance provides temporary assistance to Anchorage-area Alaska Natives and Native Americans (with permanent residence in Anchorage for the last six months) with essential needs such as food, shelter, fuel, etc. Income guidelines apply; all applicants must concurrently apply for all federal, state, or tribal programs in which they are eligible. Priority system applies.

Hospitality & Tourism Career Institute (HTCI)

HTCI's mission is to provide education, training, and placement opportunities in the hospitality and tourism industry for Alaska Native and American Indians, age 18 and over. Classes are tuition – free to eligible participants. Training and education offered through HTCI prepares individuals for entry level employment in the hospitality and tourism industry with skills learned and industry validated certificates for successful completers. Field trips and job shadowing at different sites throughout the Anchorage area provide an introduction to the various jobs within the hospitality and tourism industry. Training areas include the Alaska Host/Cultural Host training, Hotel Front Desk training, Barista training, Warranty of Employability, Culinary Arts/ServSafe training, and Entrepreneurship training.

The Individual Development Account program (IDA) helps low-income families become homeowners, small business owners and receive financial assistance with education opportunities. CITC IDA offers participants matching funds for savings accounts, courses on how to save and manage money, and individual counseling to meet savings goals. Eligibility requirements include being Alaska Native or American Indian; residing in the Municipality of Anchorage, and falling under certain income limits.

The Alaska Department of Labor & Workforce Development (DOLWD) is providing assistance to CITC and its customers. Four days a week, DOLWD team members will provide job-training assistance through the Workforce Investment Act (WIA), and the State Training and Employment Program (STEP). Additional assistance is available from a DOLWD Employment Counselor who will help individuals seeking to become gainfully employed find the job that best suits them.

Supported Work Services

This program provides paid and unpaid work experience for Alaska Natives, Native Americans and Pacific Islanders living in the Cook Inlet region. Services are provided based on needs and include participants with little or no work experience, unemployed or underemployed. Supported work includes volunteer, fully subsidized and partially subsidized positions at both for-profit and nonprofit work sites. Services include employer outreach, assessment and career guidance, work site development and monitoring, job search assistance, job placement and job coaching.

Supportive Services provides financial assistance for Alaska Native/Native Americans and Pacific Native Hawaiians residing in the Municipality of Anchorage for the last 30 days. Supportive services include clothing, bus passes and other costs associated with gaining or maintaining employment, training or education. Income limits apply.

The Employment and Training Services department provides case management and eligibility determination for Alaska Native TANF recipients living in the Municipality of Anchorage. The objective of the program is self-sufficiency through employment. Services include job search, training and education, SBIRT screenings, career guidance, referrals to other services, etc. Additionally, there are State of Alaska Eligibility Technicians on site at Cook Inlet Tribal Council for participants to apply for Food Stamps and Medicaid.

The Tribal Vocational Rehabilitation Project assists Alaska Natives and American Indians with disabilities who reside in the Cook Inlet region attain their employment goals. The service delivery system includes a myriad of culturally relevant vocational rehabilitation services available to all eligible participants of the program. The staff assists participants in the development of an employment plan that is consistent with their strengths, resources, priorities, concerns, abilities, capabilities and informed choices so that they may prepare for and engage in gainful employment, including self employment, telecommuting and business ownership.

RECOVERY SERVICES

Recovery Services incorporates the “System of Care” model of service delivery, wherein services are coordinated through case management and include traditional substance abuse services, one-on-one counseling, groups, treatment planning, relapse prevention plans as well as access to mental health, vocational/job skill development and training, employment, housing, family and social services. At the Ernie Turner Center we have developed a “therapeutic village of care” model of residential treatment, using a traditional Village Council as the peer-led source of self-governance within the treatment center. This is an Alaska Native cultural adaptation of the therapeutic community model of treatment. The model also builds upon the Recovery Camp movement in Alaska which emulates traditional Alaska Native “village subsistence” culture. Within the “village of care model” our family members engage in increasing levels of self-empowerment until they are truly in charge of their own treatment. Incorporating their culture into treatment planning and problem solving mechanisms. They function within the family as department heads over the tasks associated with maintaining the house and work therapy assignments.

The Ernie Turner Center is composed of four individual treatment programs:

- Wisdom Place for elders 55 or over
- Recovery Journey for adults between 18-55 which includes co-occurring disorder services enhancement
- Transitions for adults 18-55 who are homeless
- Emergency Care/Detox Unit

Wisdom Place is a six-bed residential unit specifically for Alaska Native Elders. Eligibility requirement: Adults age 55 and older who are assessed to need this level of support.

Recovery Journey is an eight-bed, 60 to 90 day co-ed residential program that is specifically designed to treat adults over the age of 18 and under the age of 55 who have been assessed to receive this level of care. Effective January 2006, the Recovery Journey program was enhanced to accommodate up to six patients with co occurring disorders (mental health and substance abuse).

Transitions is a five bed co-ed unit for adults that is designed for individuals who are eligible: they must be homeless and have extensive involvement with Community Patrol Services as determined by number of interventions or “pick ups” in the last 30 days. Services are for up to 6 months with 5-6 months being recommended to address the very specific needs of this population.

Emergency Care/Detox Unit is a six-bed adult unit and is a partnership with Southcentral Foundation and the Municipality of Anchorage. Eligibility requirements: Open to Alaska Natives and Native Americans within the Anchorage Service Unit. The detox unit is staffed by nurses and a medical director.

Patients are primarily treated for substance abuse disorders but also receive mental health care (one-on-one individual MH counseling) by mental health clinicians to treat individuals that require both services. All patients receive group therapy, life skills development, relapse prevention, sober support, family support, one on one substance abuse counseling, treatment planning and case management. Patients can receive UAs on site which enhances accountability of sobriety.

Co-Ed Adult Outpatient Unit is comprised of adult men and women who experience substance abuse or addiction and have been assessed and recommended to Level I Outpatient (OP) care requiring up to 8 hours of treatment which includes groups, individual, mental health counseling, case management and other activities aimed at encouraging sobriety and recovery. Clients remain in treatment for three to six months which includes Continuing Care.

Continuing Care Services are provided for those adults who have just completed outpatient treatment. Continuing Care is individualized and can include a weekly group, one-on-one counseling and some case management prior to graduation. Continuing Care is a supportive time wherein the client maintains connections with the agency but generally is functioning independently with sober supports using the skills learned in treatment to remain in recovery.

Intervention Services

Intervention Services is composed of two intervention programs which are served out of two locations. Intervention services differ from “treatment” services in that there is a component of prevention involved and typical treatment modalities are not offered in the same sense as in Outpatient or Residential services.

Pathways is a prevention and intervention program for homeless individuals who experience public inebriation and who also may be involved with Community Patrol Services—both entities work side by side in providing safety and intervention to this population. Services by Pathways staff include street outreach and case management which assists the individual locate detox, treatment or various shelters, housing and resources for meals, clothing and other needed items. Staff members are located at the Municipality Transfer Station and the CITC Detox unit. The intent is to help this population access appropriate treatment and stable housing.

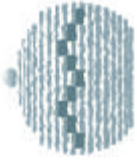
The Connections program in partnership with Southcentral Foundation, offers Screening, Brief Intervention, Brief Therapy, and Referral to Treatment (SBIRT) services to adults in Anchorage. This program offers a unique opportunity for individuals to receive a screening for their alcohol and drug use. "Intervention" services will be provided based on the screening and/or risk level identified by the screen. Additionally Connections offers assessment and pre-treatment services for those clients who need more than what brief intervention or brief therapy are designed to offer. Assessment and other clinical staff meet three times a week and utilize the ASAM Placement Criteria as well as DSM IV diagnosis for substance abuse. Participants who cannot be immediately placed in their recommended level of treatment receive pre-treatment services while waiting for a treatment opening which includes group, one-on-one counseling and case management.
